Are you missing out on opportunities due to a lack of a Grade 12 diploma. Are you worried about spending a lot of time and effort getting one. Don't fret, its easier than you think. Most employers (and most but not all post secondary programs) require a minimum Grade 12 or GED. The GED is what is commonly referred to as a Grade 12 equivalency, however there are some significant differences.

Recent changes have made it much easier to get your Grade 12 as an adult learner. Co-op credits, Past Learning Experience and the option of changing courses that were once considered compulsory are just a few of the new options available. Credits earned in other jurisdictions can also be applied.

On May 2nd from 9:30 till Noon we will be hosting an information session on these changes at the CAW Local 195 Hall at 3400 Somme. Representatives from St. Michaels (Adult Day School), The Adult Learning Centre (Night School) as well as St. Clair College, The Assessment Centre and the Multi-Cultural Association will be on hand to help you reach your goal and answer your questions.

SECOND CAREER STRATEGY

Second Career provides financial supports to laid-off workers who require skills training to assist them to find employment in demand occupations in Ontario.

WHO IS ELIGIBLE?

Anyone considering up to one year of upgrading to get a Grade 12 diploma, or as a prerequisite to get into a skills course **and/or** anyone considering a skills course between 6 months and 2 years in duration.

- A) E.I. active claimants
- B) Reachback claimants – formerly on claim in the past 3 years (or 5yrs for those on maternity or parental claim)
- C) Non-E.I. and laid-off on or after 01 January 2005
- D) Anyone still in receipt of Severance
- E) Persons who have taken a job (less pay or hours than what they used to make before Lay-Off) to make ends meet after their lay off are eligible whether they are now unemployed or still working in such a job. (Yes, you could be authorized to quit that less than suitable job, if you have selected a course that will ensure a better paying job in the future).

HOW IS TRAINING FINANCED?

A maximum total of \$28,000 per individual is available for a skill course. This is expected to cover tuition as well as your living expenses (E.I. Benefits and/or Training Allowance).

You can expect to continue to collect the number of weeks of E.I. Benefits that have been allocated to you, before a training allowance would come into effect.

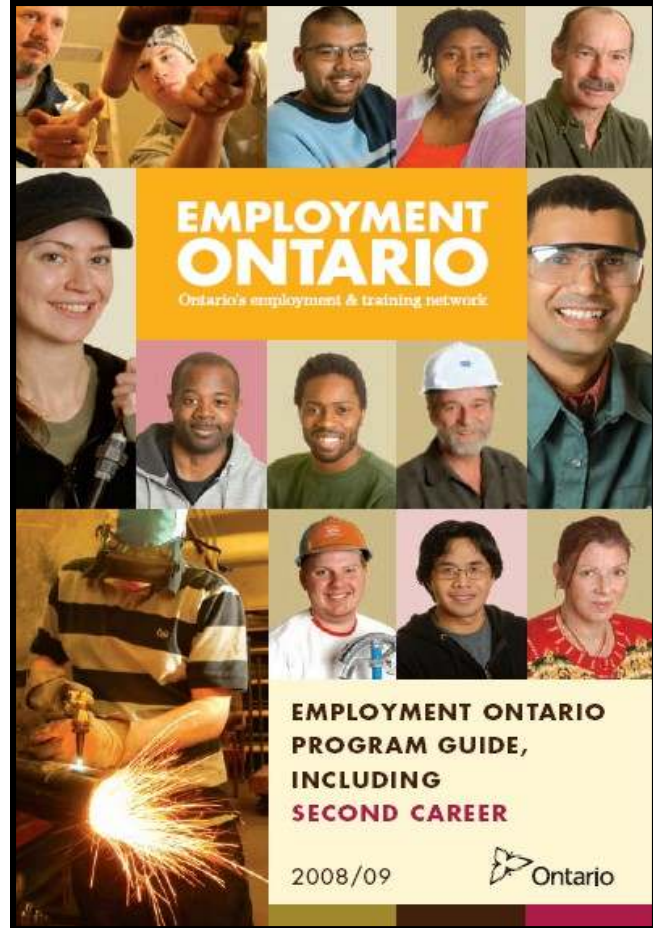
ADDITIONAL FUNDS ARE AVAILABLE TO COVER:

- Dependant care allowance (babysitter or daycare)
- Living Away from Home Allowance (Yes, extra living expenses are available if your school is out of town)
- Your present E.I. benefits or a training allowance (if your benefits have ended) can be made available to support you while you upgrade your credits for a Grade 12 Diploma

WHAT COURSES ARE ELIGIBLE?

A course that will provide you skills for a demand occupation in Ontario and is offered by an accredited college like:

St Clair College, Trios College, Everest College, Canadian College, Academy of Learning, CompuCampus College, Windsor Welding Institute, Ontario Truck Driving School, Northstar Truck Driving School, Transportation Training Centres of Canada, 5th Wheel, SPC Eagle Logistics, Etc.....



The Ontario Ministry of Training Colleges and Universities (MTCU) is the government agency that is responsible for this training strategy and offers two lists of Demand Occupations in Ontario. These occupations are listed in the Statistic Canada NOC Skills Matrix “B” & “C” and are available from your Labour Adjustment Centre or each agency that process training requests for the MTCU.

TRILLIUM DRUG BENEFIT SEMINAR



The Trillium Drug Benefit Program has been established to help residents of Ontario who are without benefits, obtain prescription medication. The program covers the cost of regular prescription drugs, less a deductible amount. The annual deductible is based on income relative to prescription costs. Generally (with many exceptions) the deductible is based on approximately 4% of a family's annual net income. There are many offsets to this formula depending on family size and other variables. However as a base example, a family with an annual NET income of \$20,000 would have an annual deductible of \$800.00. The deductible is spread out over each quarter so that your deductible for a 3 month period would be \$200, afterwards the cost of medication would be covered by the program (less a \$2.00 co-pay). To qualify, you must be a resident of Ontario with a provincial (OHIP) health card.

We realize that there are many of our members are no longer covered by company benefits, or perhaps their benefits are set to expire soon. Therefore we have arranged for a representative from the Ministry of Health to discuss this program with affected members at an information session on Wednesday, April 8th at 12:30.

The information session will take place at the Local 195 Hall at 3400 Somme Avenue. Assistance will also be provided for the application process at this time.



Seating is limited, therefore we ask that you call or visit the Labour Adjustment Centre to register in advance. If you are unavailable to attend, you may be able to send a family member in your place. Please call the Adjustment Centre at 256-6142 for further information.

SUBSTANCE ABUSE/EMPLOYEE ASSISTANCE

It's a tough world out there. Unemployed. Don't know what to do and the bills keep coming in. Your relationships with your spouse, girl/boyfriend and children are marred because of the situation you're in. It's all too easy to reach for the bottle or drugs to take your mind away from it all.

If this sounds all too familiar to you, chances are you may need a little help. I've been a Substance Abuse Counselor for many years and I'm here to tell you that it doesn't have to be this way. It's easy to let yourself go and harder to get yourself started into a new destiny or career path when you let stimulants do your thinking and your talking for you.

WHAT IS APPRENTICESHIP ?

Apprenticeship is an agreement between a person (an apprentice) who wants to learn a skill and an employer who needs a skilled worker. Apprenticeship is a proven industry-based learning system that combines on-the-job experience with technical classroom training to produce a certified journeyperson. For some apprentices, especially in Quebec, the technical classroom training can be taken upfront through the secondary school system, followed by successive years of on-the-job training. Upon completion of the specified training period, apprentices receive a Certificate of Qualification. On average, 80% of the apprentice's two to five year program is spent in the workplace; the rest is spent at a training institution.



Each province and territory has the responsibility for apprenticeship training. Canada currently has 13 different apprenticeship systems, where each province and territory governs their own training and certification policies.

Legislation permits provinces and territories to designate apprenticeship programs for their own requirements.

Over 200 apprenticeship programs are currently available across Canada.

The Government of Canada recognizes that the skilled trades are essential to building and maintaining Canada's place in the knowledge-based economy. It has a clear role in supporting interprovincial labour mobility in the skilled trades and in encouraging more Canadians to pursue apprenticeships and hence meet the growing need for skilled tradespeople that is crucial to the sustained growth of the economy. The recent open house we held at Local 195 certainly generated a lot of interest. Well over 100 people attended the session and 76 made an initial application. However, by the time all was said and done 85 members put their names forward to begin the process.

The Assessment Centre has done a fantastic job moving our people through the system as quickly and efficiently as possible.

At the time of writing this it looks as though around 40 people will be going to school for this course.

The candidates have been selected from the initial list of interested members.

Around 52 people originally applied to be accepted and when the screening process was complete there were 25 successful candidates.

The schedules have been finalized by St. Clair College and classes are to begin on March 30th.

The course is 24 weeks long plus a 4 week job placement at the end.

We will keep you informed of how they are progressing and we wish all of them luck as they embark on their new chosen career.

JOB DEVELOPMENT—IT'S NOT ALL DOOM & GLOOM

When I was first approached with the offer of becoming the job developer here at the Community Labour Centre I was a bit hesitant definitely thinking that I was being set up to fail! I mean look at the economy, seriously how am I supposed to try to approach potential employers and ask if they are hiring. What I have found is that I have been pleasantly surprised.

I have just started contacting all of the employers in the community and have actually had a few workplaces that have been looking for workers and am anticipating that in the coming weeks there will be more. There seems to be a demand for general labourers in seasonal type work, as well as work in different fields. The employers have been more than happy to hear from us too! They seem to be liking the fact that the workers and the employers are not being charged a fee for using the centres resources and also that most of our members qualify for the Targeted Wage Subsidy (TWS) Program. If you are unfamiliar with the TWS program please call one of the peer helpers here at the Community Labour Adjustment Centre and they will gladly help direct you as to how you can get signed up for the program.



There has also been a positive response from other employers that may not be doing any hiring right now but that have said when they find themselves in a position to hire they will definitely give us a call. So if you have yet to visit the centre please come on down and drop off your resume, the worst thing that can happen is that it will count towards your job search!

There are also a few other options that you have in the meantime. You can access the government retraining programs and become what you always wanted to be when you grow up or look into self employment through the Self Employment Assistance program.
